A Real Rescue Mission

Susie* filled out an application online for Shepherd's Gate because someone had told her that she could find help here. But she didn't really believe it could happen. Then Alicia, one of our Campus Directors, received her application and called her.

When Alicia talked with her, she realized there were two major obstacles blocking Susie's path

to Shepherd's Gate. The first one would be the most difficult: believing there was hope.

Barrier One: Hope

"Susie felt absolutely, utterly hopeless," Alicia says. "She felt that God had basically left her."

Susie was struggling to stay sober. She had a serious ongoing court case for custody of her children that looked bleak. She thought that . . .

... getting sober and being able to take care of her kids the way she wanted was impossible.

But Alicia didn't abandon Susie. She talked with her on the phone and spent time listening to her. When Alicia found out that Susie was staying in a motel not far from her house, she went and visited her face-to-face.

By connecting with her and building a relationship, Alicia was able to help Susie scrape together enough hope to believe she could change.

Barrier Two: Getting Here

The next obstacle to helping Susie was how to actually get her to our Livermore campus. Susie's car was unreliable and would break down often. She was scared to drive it over Vasco Road into Livermore. So Alicia came up with a plan.

"I put Susie in my car with me, and then we followed my husband in her car," Alicia says. "He's a mechanic, so if we broke down he might have been able to do something as a temporary fix."

Thankfully Susie was able to make it to Shepherd's Gate, where friends like you made it possible for her life to begin to change.

Susie is now in the final phase of the program! She overcame her addictions and began a clean, sober life. She's received an outstanding report from CPS and is hoping to move into her own apartment soon.

None of this could have even been possible without the prayers and support of friends like you!

Alicia Hammond, Livermore Campus Director; Brittany McCarty, Livermore Residential Supervisor; and Alicia Quay, Brentwood Campus Director are three staff members who regularly go out as part of the Shepherd's Gate Rescue Outreach Team. Here are some frequently asked questions about this part of our ministry.

Q: What does Shepherd's Gate's Rescue Outreach Team look like?

A: The Rescue Outreach Team adapts to every situation. For some, it may be going to meet them to help with transportation to our campus. One staff member saw a woman sleeping in her car and reached out to her to build a relationship and tell her about Shepherd's Gate. Homeless women need to build a trust with our staff, which means they need to see them multiple times to believe them.

Q: Does everyone who the team talks to end up going to Shepherd's Gate?

A: Sadly, no. Some women are just not ready to take the step yet. But they know that Shepherd's Gate is here for them whenever they are ready.

Q: Is it ever unsafe to go on these "rescues?"

A: Shepherd's Gate does everything we can to make sure no one is going into an unsafe situation. Everyone goes out in pairs, and never alone. We always tell someone else where we're going and check in with each other frequently. And sometimes the police accompany us.

Q: How can supporters be involved?

A: While you can't come with us when we rescue someone, there are still ways you can be involved! First, you can pray for the women and the staff. Second, you can donate to help provide lifechanging care for the residents.

Each of our staff who participates in our "rescues" have specific reasons for their passion.

"Brittany and I were rescued, and we know what that feels like. So I think that's why it's so important to go out there and do the same for others, like it was done for us." –Alicia

> "I think that seeing everything first hand is important. When I'm looking into someone's eyes, I literally can see the pain. I think they can reciprocate and see the compassion and empathy we have." –Brittany
